

USA, UK, NZ, Australia are currently dominated by Bad Actors. Even worse the corrupt are becoming more corrupt and totalitarian clamping down on people who question, debate or criticize and organizing witch hunts and whipping up the mob to personally attack those who dare to stand up to their entrenched corruption e.g. ABC and Australian Senate attacks on Bettina Arndt and many others. Victorian Police shoot rubber bullets at people in the streets for daring to question yet Police take the Knee to Women, Blacks and Muslims who foment tribal violence.

Everything the Greens/Labour politicians - do or say is corrupt - none of them ever plan to tell the truth about anything or act in Australia's best interest - in fact they do everything they can to

Parliament is debased - the idea of debate is debased - the balance of powers is debased and tribal binary tyrants use government money to advertise their tribalism. This is happening all over Australia where Taxpayer funds are used to virtue signal for the binary tribe and buy votes - corruption and nepotism is now fully entrenched.

While at school and university, students are embroiled in a multiplicity of human engagement. Social, Intellectual, emotional, physical - at every level the student is bouncing between many things. They are in the "thick of things"

I went on holiday to warmer places for a week.

I have been reading Dan Dennett "I've been thinking" - which is more about his life story of "doing", Upanishads, Rene Descartes, and **F. A Hayek's exploration of Mills and Taylor.**https://archive.org/details/johnstuartmillha00mill/page/4/mode/2up

<u>An Aside</u>. I found a copy of F.A. Hayek's book in a bookshop in Derby Street in Newcastle, Australia for \$8. A bargain - I am not a book investor, I am a book reader and this is a valuable book for me - as many other books are. i.e. it may sell for higher places on the "market" but I value this book in my library.

I can see the teenage love, language and feelings exploration in Mills and Taylor in their letters which correspond to my teenage mind at 15-17. But flowery sensibilities and feelings were **being explored** in poetry, literature and plays in many places https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Pierre de Marivaux Pierre Carlet de Chamblain de Marivaux 4 February 1688 – 12 February 1763), commonly referred to as Marivaux, was a French playwright and novelist.

But Mills had a pressured upbringing which is not easy to understand. The love of things - in the vaguest sense - seems to invoke exploration in a variety of forms. In Mills and Taylor it was the poetic framework of vague and specific intertwined the in the language of appreciation of some kind of shared journey. From Hayek's book on Mills and Taylor book I get many things but one is **Leghorn**. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Livorno which in Mill's time was seen as some kind of model town but had also been a free trade town and a slave trade hub. Mills and Taylor visited as did many other travelers. Maybe I should wax lyrical on the marvelous sensibilities of the love/dove birds but maybe I will value that at a later time.

Dan Dennett's life spans the major technologic developments in my lifetime (computers, space travel, logic, cognition) and he has written the kind of book I would have liked to see Rene Descartes write - many of Descartes interactions during his life are difficult to find records for. Dan was in the thick of human development - he was respected and engaged by many and surrounded by many changes of his time - philosophy, computers, artificial Intelligence, 60's counter culture, drugs, universities, thought, cognition, language, music, art, culture - post world war 2 intellectual exploration.

The Upanishads represent some older vague ideas - always learning - the teacher and the student. The question and the response. Not this, Not that - try something else.

Rene and his interpreters - what was Rene thinking? Dan Dennett sees Rene as being "wrong" (Mind Body duality - in a binary certain split) but everything is within a greater context - you need historical context to explore the "truth". Religious zealots were exalting "Soul"

https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Henry More More rejected Cartesian dualism on the following grounds: "It would be easier for me to attribute matter and extension to the soul, than to attribute to an immaterial thing the capacity to move and be moved by the body."- what impact does that have? Like for me, now, Women and Black tribes are dominating my historical local landscape - promoted by pig-ignorant weak minded men.

From the Upanishads we get a method of learning but also statements of morality - giving food to the hungry and growing food. From Dan Dennett we get morality about not cheating - the stories of plagiarists and students who cheat, the morality of superior knowledge over the student - don't bully but try to encourage learning and debate - after all, we could be wrong with what we think we know. From Mill and Taylor we get intense morality about relationships, parents, husband and wife. From Rene Descartes we get morality of learning - of understanding your own ignorance. Rene Descartes also placed God inside his thoughts - *Meditation II of God, that he exists "And the whole strength of the argument which I have made use of to prove the existence of God consists of this - a God , I say whose idea is in me, i.e. who possesses all those supreme perfections of which our mind may indeed may have some idea, but with understanding them all, who is liable to no errors or defect [and has no of those marks which denote imperfection]". Placing God (of certain "perfection") as an idea that individuals could have in their own minds was a dangerous idea when the Mob religious dogma ruled. - A Personal idea rather than a Tribal idea. Descartes influence spread not only in the "protestant" group of religions but also the "catholic - Pope" collection.*

The idea of religious differences and debate was spreading in close proximity and frequency between people at **Leiden University** (Protestant) and **Leuvan University** (Catholic).



Rene's discussions were highly heretical, Dan Dennett's thoughts were in a far less dangerous time and place - when debate and argument was encouraged, Mills and Taylor's thoughts on Love, relationships and marriage were in a time when England was exploring marriage, divorce, children especially the "sanctity" of relationships in the "Eyes of God and the church" - continuing from Henry XIII's time - the "Eyes of God, Church, State and the people"

Understanding Understanding, Belief and the Biological Bitch



Our ability to take responsibility for our own behaviour includes taking responsibility for our own individual learning and development. From the Upinishads to Dan Dennett - we see people learning and developing knowledge and skills - meeting people - learning from others making mistakes and civilized disagreement, recognition of ignorance and awakening self awareness.

Dan Dennett has done more work than many on the idea of being conscious and the mind. https://sites.tufts.edu/cogstud/daniel-dennett/ https://as.tufts.edu/news-

Gilbert's exploration included the idea that "Knowing How" to do something is different to the idea of "Knowing That" is. But we can also consider the Brain in a Vat exploration https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Brain in a vat as part of the mind, body conscience debate.

But we now get some kind of idea of understanding what understanding might mean. People can copy what they see other people do - this is one of the first steps of learning - copying others - not eating Poisoned apples but eating good ones. This can be passed on non-verbally as a slap or a warning grunt to a child who is about to eat the bright shiny red apple which is poison and death. These messages can be passed on non-verbally for generations so that people can learn without any real understanding other than - "if you eat that apple you die". You know how to do something - like rowing a boat or avoiding bad apples with limited understanding other than copying and learning from others. Reading is like that - as well as mathematics. People can read by rote not really understanding what reading is. You can manipulate words and sounds and formulas and string words together in a word-salad way - copying what others have done - so that you "Fit in with the mob". Children who read books out loud in classrooms are learning how to become competent readers by practicing and repeating what other people do - by listening to the sounds, by moving their mouths, by using their eyes to read the words and translate that into sounds that people can hear. They practice doing, listening, speaking and reading. They build their confidence.

Dan Dennett might call this "*Competence without comprehension*" https://www.goodreads.com/quotes/10226863-competence-without-comprehension-is-the-way-of-life-of-the

"Competence without comprehension is the way of life of the vast majority of living things on the planet and should be the default presumption until we can demonstrate that some individual organisms really do, in one sense or another, understand what they are doing."


Or to put it another way - we may learn through practicing how to do things and what choices to make but then we get to a stage about understanding - not only the practice and skills about the "What" - the analysis and description of the "How". Hence we can move abstractions from specific "How to row a boat" to Boat design in general and the idea of flows and fluid dynamics. *E.g. - what the hell are we doing - well, this is the way we have always done it - well what is it exactly that we are doing?* What, Who, Where, When, How and Why.

For example - even people who think they are educated have no real understanding of what they are doing or why - they tend to just habitually follow a performance pattern or some kind of narcissistic self stimulation. For Women and Blacks (on average) it is the constant tribal **entitled victim narrative** - See **Women Lawyers – Corruption – Feminism – Debate** https://humanistman.com/wp-content/uploads/2020/07/Women-Lawyers-Corruption-Feminism-Debate.pdf . Muslims

deliberately induce a daily habitual repetitive mind state and a violent nihilist entitled victim mind state (like zombies) through chants, bowing, rituals and repetitions of simple words - like brain washing and enhanced indoctrination techniques - all associated with violence and death.

If we combine practical experience with theory we get greater understanding of the How and the What.

As we can choose to shift our focus around (Because we are self aware) we can drill down to ever more detail or abstract out to higher and higher levels - a kind of Zoom and Focus thing - as well as making different connections at different levels of abstraction. Dan Dennett discusses the "Meta, Meta" game where thinkers go down a recursive meta, meta, meta analysis - I can out "Meta" anyone. *Come on people lets focus! SCUTA.*



We may want to separate out things to focus on and explore and discuss but as my **Focus model** shows - things are on a continuum and you can choose many things to compare and contrast using or SAME/DIFFERENT binary differentiation system (strong habit).

Why Compare Mind and Body? Someone asserted "Body" and then religious fanatics asserted "Soul".

Rene asserted "Mind".

I could assert "Body" "Food" - i.e. when is it a body and when is it "Food" inside the body or part of the body or waste. Same with Air, radiation, heat, cold, movement, gravity.

Given that 95% of the universe is "Dark" to humans - what role does the vat play? What is outside the vat which makes a difference? Does that vat have to move, be heated and have dramatic changes to chemical mix, chaotic spills, etc.

So what then? Maybe we could do a behaviorists approach



Norms of Correction - Language. Copying things - without comprehension. Memes and cultural development. Belief about internal "Goodness" and "Morality". "I am a "Good" person".

Your **personal and private subjective beliefs** are NONE OF MY BUSINESS - especially if you believe you are "Good".

We can see anticipation and planning emerge from Imagination. We can imagine many things which have never happened and may not happen. We can pull together many different ideas to imagine things which do not exist. We can watch a Punch and Judy puppet show and shout out "He is behind you" in anticipation of possible outcomes. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Punch_and_Judy

We can believe many things about ourselves, about others and about the world - real and imagined.

The Real world (Objective Reality) is where our beliefs are tested. Objective Reality does not care how "good" you believe yourself to be.

Understanding increases as we develop - first we copy things and follow the social norms and then as we learn and our understanding increases. We notice things - then we learn the ability to notice ourselves. Then we learn to notice our interactions with others and the world. We become more self aware.

We see examples of the three systems working together - Imagination, Belief and Reality.

In the Olympic Games - there is the imagination of possible scenarios, the Belief in ability and achieving the possible outcomes and then the Outcome of the event - the final result - where imagination and belief meet reality. This is practiced through years of training. The Stopwatch never lies.

The **Biological Bitch** is the same as the Biological Bastard - in other words - you may include your mind in your self but your self also includes many other things **related to your biology** - your comfort, your feelings, your hunger, your "needs" - so if you attempt something difficult to do and you have not taken care of the Biological Bitch which is YOU and WHAT YOU AR RESPONSIBLE FOR - that is your problem. Do not BLAME your feelings or reaction based on your biology - your biology is your responsibility. If you are thirsty - drink water, if your are hungry - eat food - if you are tired - sleep - if you are Fat - lose weight - if you are weak - build strength - do not take on tasks or interactions with other people unless you are responsible and accountable for your behaviour and choices. Become more sentient about your self including your senses, understanding and beliefs.

Stop Bitching about your biology and get on with things!


Laughter as a Response to Observation of Darwinian Danger

I am investigating the idea that people laugh when they see something playing out as an evolutionary warning - watching other people make Darwinian mistakes. Imagine the expression "It is like watching an inevitable slow motion train wreck"

The emotional response is a developed evolutionary **EMPHASIS** on your memory to remind you not to do that mistake. More than that - it is associated with a **pleasure type emotion** so that it is a "friendly reminder" and not an anxiety or fear driven response.

I FEEL GOOD about avoiding AND UNDERSTANDING AND KNOWING HOW TO AVOID an Evolutionary Mistake simultaneously balanced between FEELING AFRAID about making an Evolutionary Mistake. Further explorations of this Feel Good might expose the ideas of Smug, Self-Satisfied, Fat, Dumb, Lazy, Complacency and Delusion. i.e. you might think you have UNDERSTANDING on how to HOW TO AVOID an Evolutionary Mistake but you could be wrong and have not re-tested your ideas as things change in the chaotic world around you. Somewhere in the



There is a slightly different frame when comparing Feelings and Chaos. In Human Feelings about learning - there is an emphasis on the student and child overcoming their feelings of fear to build their confidence and make choices based less on fear of doing something wrong or making inevitable mistakes. Making little mistakes in your own playground is not as damaging as making large mistakes on the world stage. But The Fool also feels "good" or at least - feels no fear - as he takes on chaos. If the fool survives then he might repeat his choices and survive the next time and many times after that - in other words - the fool is a competent survivor not necessarily comprehending what he did

or what might have happened. Most of human evolution is like that - **survival choices by uncomprehending fools**. This scenario is displayed humorously in many ways, for example, by Charlie Chaplain - who walks through a chaotic scene of dangers and pitfalls - which they audience can see - but he is completely unaware of - yet he happens to make exactly the right moves at the right time to avoid disaster. The audience reacts and sometimes laughs.





If you work hard you might realize after the event what happened and what the possible consequences were. Much of human development has been about being wiser before the event. This leads to the problem of "experts" - the "wise ones" - who want to mandate all choice. These "wise elites" are usually too stupid to know how stupid they are and suffer from smug complacency as well as binary certainty. Another factor is that the "Wise" become more aware of the dangers they avoided by dumb luck and hence build up more fear about making those choices again.

One of the main problems of knowledge is becoming smug because you have some.

If you call yourself "Wise" then you missed the point.

If you pursue wisdom with some understanding of the idea of learning then you will make mistakes, you will be afraid, you may become complacent, over confident and many other things along the way you may understand more about The Human Condition.

Many 1600s elites smugly thought they were very clever and knew everything https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Quarrel of the Ancients and the Moderns The Quarrel of the Ancients and the Moderns (French: Querelle des Anciens et des Modernes) was a debate about

literary and artistic merit, which expanded from the original debaters to the members of the **Académie Française** and the French literary community in the 17th century.

But many throughout history have claimed perfection, understanding and the solution to the Human condition. The New "Messiah", "Utopia", world wide "Movements", Religions, Greens/Labour, Muslims, etc https://www.humancondition.com/about-the-world-transformation-movement/, https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Brave New World

So we can see Both the Fool and the Wise man Feeling Good about themselves as they make the decisions and choices about how they evolve in a Darwinian sense. The fool is blissfully unaware of problems and the Mage/Magician is overconfident - he feels that he is no longer the fool. Children - especially Boys - are naturally inquisitive and tend to make mistakes and laugh at their own mistakes - possibly as some kind of inbuilt recognition of learning. E.g. "Gosh - that was a silly thing to do" - where as girls tend to (on average) scold https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Common_scold, denigrate , form into groups (Building strong social groups by laughing at and attacking others) and attack anyone who makes a mistake. Women struggle learn anything which is not already accepted by the social group. For example Women cheered and laughed as a tribe when Julia Gillard declared "I will"

not be lectured to by that man". Tanya Plibersek attacks men and calls them names "Voldermort" calling out the women tribes for a women tribal group laugh and encouraging public denigration of a man and group attacks.

So this **laughing at Darwinian mistakes** is far from a tickling and response interplay or a social group response - it is more of a **cognitive laugh** closer to anticipated fear, relief, astonishment and laughter. It is also not necessarily a communication idea of verbal, facial expression, social interaction, bonding or social cohesion. It has more to do with asking the question :

"Why did you laugh when you saw that old man fall off the bike?"

Clowns and others have evoked emotional responses from their audience and are well trained with timing and performance displays which are wrapped around the ideas of:

- Shared Imagination what might happen especially as speculation of possible scenarios grows within a crowd the crowd murmurs
- Subjective Belief what each person believes might be the outcome in the future
- **Objective Reality** what finally happens at the end of the performance.

So the question is not only why laugh at the misfortune of others? But also Why laugh at the long drawn anticipation of the possible Darwinian mistake evolving in front of your eyes.

We see the interplay of strong emotional responses, fear, anxiety, relief, laughter - all thrown into a melting pot as the event *plays out* - but this the cognitive part of the brain driving the emotional responses - you are not being physically "tickled" - but it may also have to do with the idea of "Play" and playing around with ideas and imagined scenarios and testing them out.

Children **play and learn boundaries** as they go - not only of social interactions - but watching and observing others they get an idea of "things" as well as people. The Man who enters the rodeo ring or the bull fight is placing himself in obvious danger but seeming to escape with the great relief of everyone. But laughter may also be invoked at various stages during the display along with relief and fear. See https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Harry_Houdini *Erik Weisz* (March 24, 1874 – October 31,

Nevertheless to write now the reforming of Education, though it be one of the greatest and noblest designs that can be thought on, and for the want whereof this Nation perishes, I had not yet at this time been induc't, but by your earnest entreaties, and serious conjurements; as having my mind for the present half diverted in the pursuance of some other assertions, the knowledge and the use of which, cannot but be a great furtherance both to the enlargement of truth, and honest living, with much more peace. Nor should the laws of any private friendship have prevail'd with me to divide thus, or transpose my former thoughts, but that I see those aims, those actions which have won you with me the esteem of a person sent hither by some good providence from a far country to be the occasion and the incitement of great good to this Island. And, as I hear, you have obtain'd the same repute with men of most approved wisdom, and som of the highest authority among us. Not to mention the learned correspondence which you hold in forreign parts, and the extraordinary pains and diligence which you have us'd in this matter both here, and beyond the Seas; either by the definite will of God so ruling, or the peculiar sway of nature, which also is Gods working. Neither can I think that so reputed, and so valu'd as you are, you would to the forfeit of your own discerning ability, impose upon me an unfit and over-ponderous argument, but that the satisfaction which you profess to have receiv'd from those incidental Discourses which we have wander'd into, hath prest and almost constrain'd you into a perswasion, that what you require from me in this point, I neither ought nor can in conscience deferre beyond this time both of so much need at once, and so much opportunity to try what God hath determin'd. I will not resist therefore, whatever it is either of divine, or humane obligement that you lay upon me; but will forthwith set down in writing, as you request me, that voluntary Idea, which hath long in silence presented it self to me, of a better Education, in extent and comprehension far more large, and yet of time far shorter, and of attainment far more certain, then hath been yet in practice.

Spinoza also understands the concept of Same and Different

IP5: In Nature there cannot be two or more substances of the same nature or attribute.

He understands that infinite things exist.

IP11: God, or a substance consisting of infinite attributes, each of which expresses eternal and infinite essence, necessarily exists.

How did he get to this understanding? He questioned things and did a lot of work. He was surrounded by people and a time in history which helped him to understand. He wrote to people, he read a lot and studied hard and was open to debate and criticism. He sought out critical thinkers. He wrote out his thoughts in Letters and sent them to people seeking a response.

He entered school on the same day as Nicolaas Heinsius, 6 whose father, the famous poet and philologist Daniel Heinsius, taught greek and history at Leiden university. Heinsius was the editor of, among many otherworks, an influential edition of Aristotle's Politics, and his son Nicolaas later became a prolific poet in the service of the Swedish Court. 7 De la Court and Nicolaas remained friends for some time, and so, from an early age, the De la Courts came into close contact with the humanist culture that dominated Dutch intellectual society, particularly in Leiden, the bulwark of Protestant late humanism.

Pieter de la Court was to be part of many discussions and was known of by Baruch Spinoza.

A number of important meetings during his grand Tour are also likely to have impressed De la Court. The first of these took place in January 1642, when De la Court, still in London, met several times with the famous Czech philosopher Jan Amos Comenius. The initiative for this contact had come from Adriaan Heereboord, a young professor of philosophy and rhetoric at Leiden university who had possibly taught Pieter before.14 Heereboord, an important member of Cartesian circles in Dutch academia, showed a deep interest in Comenius' writings and had instructed De la Court to get in touch with the Czech philosopher. De la Court visited Comenius at his home, and, clearly impressed by this "very friendly and talkative man",15 he scrutinized Comenius's latest work, in particular his 'pansophic' treatises which aimed for a universal pedagogical and scientific reform, developed together with Samuel Hartlib from Francis Bacon's Instauratio magna.

My View of Spinoza is framed by the context of place and time. His Family were Jewish but had to pretend to be Catholic to escape persecution by Portuguese Catholic Zealots. They came to Amsterdam and joined the Jewish community there. All around people were debating religion and government and thinking. Rene Descartes said "I have doubt" - Spinoza started thinking - Religions seem to persecute people - even his own group expelled him because he failed to bow down to the

dogmatic certainty enough. The Dutch had escaped the Spanish Dogmatic oppression. Spinoza may have read *The three imposters* https://www.qutenberg.org/cache/epub/50534/pg50534-images.html "In 1654, Jean Baptiste Morin, a celebrated doctor and mathematician, wrote a letter under the name of Vincent Panurge, which he addressed to himself in this way, "An epistle to that most eminent physician, John Baptist Morin, concerning the 'Three Impostors'.11" The three impostors to whom he refers were Gassendi, Neure, and Bernier, whom he wished to satirize under this title. Christian Kortholt in 1680 employed the same terms in his work against Hebert, Hobbes, and Spinoza. " which may have been published and circulation at the time (it would have been repressed by all religions) or reached his own view on the religious dogma.

So I disagree with suggestions he was an "atheist", "heretic", "radical" https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Jonathan_Israel, "rationalist", "Jew" - he was above all a thinker - when many could not think, especially those dominated by religious dogma. i.e. some people too easily frame things using their own pre-conceived biases. I could call him a humanist - using my preferred frame but instead I use lower level terms. It is like calling people a Ranter https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Ranters or a non-Ranter as a kind of binary extremist straightjacket.

Baruch Spinoza had access to thinkers - he located himself near to Leiden (Reijnsberg Lat/long(52.19145, 4.43713)) making money by making lenses and getting access to books, bookshops, libraries and ideas. He improved his lens making skills by consulting with others. He wrote his thoughts down in a structured way in books. In the same way the Greeks, Romans others around had done. Baruch Spinoza interacted with other thinkers. He spent at least the years from 1656 to 1677 (21 years) reading, thinking and writing about the most important human ideas he could find. Compare that to me in my life I have only spent the years 2017 to 2024 (7 years) in deep work of reading, thinking and writing. John Locke spent the years 1660 to 1704 (44 years) - reading, thinking, exploring and writing and was exposed to some of the greatest minds, vigorous debates and discoveries in the history of humanity.

Baruch Spinoza considered Nature as infinite and humans are part of it and it is worth exploring and studying. The study of **Natural Sciences** https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Natural_science was considered a worthy pursuit but this upset the Religious Dogma. **John Locke** was influenced by the work of Spinoza.

Nature has an infinite number of attributes or essences, each constituting a kind of universal nature of things. We know of only two of these attributes: Thought (or thinking essence) and Extension (material essence). The course of Nature is one, since Nature is one substance, a unity. But it proceeds under each attribute in parallel coordination with its unfolding in every other attribute. Any individual thing or event is only a "mode" of Nature, manifesting itself under the different attributes. One and the same thing or event, then, manifests itself in Thought (as a mental or spiritual thing or event), in Extension (as a material thing or event), and so on through the other attributes. Thus, the human mind and the human body are one and the same thing in Nature, manifesting itself under Thought and Extension, respectively. Their union in a human being and the correlation of their states is a function of their ultimate metaphysical identity in Nature. The human being is therefore as much a part of Nature as any other thing, and is subject to the same causal

determinism that governs all of Nature... "The Power of the Intellect, or On Human Freedom" is the title of Part Five. Spinoza here turns to the ultimate benefits of the highest form of knowledge. This is a thorough understanding of Nature and its ways and an intellectual intuition of how the essence of anything follows from Nature's most universal elements — or, since God and Nature are one and the same, how the essence of anything relates to God. In this final part of the work, Spinoza takes on the issue of immortality, and demonstrates how the true rewards of virtue lie not in some otherworldly recompense but in the happiness, well-being, and blessedness that understanding confers upon us in this life.

Spinoza wrote about politics because it was the discussion of the day.

All around there were witch trials, wars, heresy trials and ongoing religious warfare at entrenched throughout society. England and the Dutch were trying to imagine what a functioning state should look like - especially the role of Kings and nobility balanced with merchants and people generally. Spinoza sought out the **comprehensive** view - he was able to see the shift in focus (my focus model) to move between the continuum of small detailed views to larger connected views.

Early in his thinking he explores **certainty** - certain good, happiness - god/bad relativity versus "**true**" good and a union with the whole of nature. He exposes his thinking process and rationale.

"Peter" is real but the **idea** of Peter is another thing. (schemas) perception and **recursive** "essence". Self Awareness and knowledge. Imagination and Memory. Fiction and Lying - False ideas. "Doubt"

VI. By God, I mean a being absolutely infinite—that is, a substance consisting in infinite attributes, of which each expresses eternal and infinite essentiality.

And then he winds "Existence" into "Essence" and Attribute" as a kind of duality

i.e. an imagined purple dragon can have *essence* and *attributes* but not **existence**. The idea of Peter is not the same as Peter.
